You can be PHYSICALLY

and yet SPIRITUALLY

very far away from Him!

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

"πειρασμός " (peirasmos)

<u>Translations</u>: trial, temptation, test, hardship, difficulty, affliction, ...

The same word is used in Verses 2, 12, 13 and 14. (also in <u>1.Cor.10:13</u>!)

No temptation has overtaken you but such as is common to man; and God is faithful, who will not allow you to be tempted/tested beyond what you are able, but with the temptation/trial will provide the way of escape also, that you may be able to endure it.

<u>1.Cor.10:13</u>

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'Consider' means we must make a mental judgement about trials. From our vantage point, most trials seem like tragic accidents. Humanly speaking, trials seem like random evil that falls on us. Daniel M. Doriani



God, who gives...

When God gives, He acts according to His nature (V.17)

...to all...

God doesn't play ,favorites'

...generously...

God gives simply. It's a pure gift! - He doesn't return a favor - He doesn't expect a favor

God`s gifts do not become debts!

...and without reproach

How would it look like to give with reproach...? God doesn't. He simply gives.

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3. The Goal / Reward (V.12)

"We gain the crown of life both by enduring trials and by loving God. The prime source for our endurance is not a grim determination to do our duty and collect our reward, it is love for God. Love is certainly the prime motivation for our walk with God." Daniel M. Doriani



"In acute cases" (IN trials)

- Keep the right "point of view" (consider it joy...)
- Seek the presence and wisdom of GOD
- Use the Armor of GOD (Eph.6:10-18)
- Seek fellowship

Preventative (preparation)

- Get to know the "truths" of and about GOD
- Further your relationship with JESUS
- Test the state of your heart (Ps.139:23&24)

- 1. God does not tempt! (V.13)
 - **1**. For He cannot be tempted
 - 2. For He does not tempt
- 2. The Problem is <u>my</u> sinfulness (V.14-15)

3. God is the giver of all good things! (V.16-17)

Because they did not believe in GOD, and did not trust in HIS salvation.




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- **1**. Become familiar with this temptation cycle (V.16)
- Trust 100% in the unchanging goodness of God (V.17)
- 3. *Know* that you have experienced the transforming power of the living God (V.18)

1. This you know... (<u>V.19-21</u>)

3. Practical conclusion (V.26-27)

How do you approach scripture?

1. This you know... (<u>V.19-21</u>)


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What steps can we take to move from appreciators to appliers?

- Write it down. Journal; write out prayers; book of remembrance; put your responses to biblical truth into writing
- 2) Talk about it. become accountable; foster relationships in which you can discuss responses to truth
- 3) **Review.** take time to read through your journal / notebook again; time is flying!
- 4) **Pray.** speak with GOD about the things you're learning; request wisdom and grace for application of truth
- 5) Slow down. take your time when you read; take time to listen; read out loud



James

Paul: is fighting against the Jewish "works-mentality" that replaces faith with works and produces "performance"

"...man is justified by faith apart from works of the law!" (<u>Rom.3:28</u>)

James: is fighting against the inconsistency (laziness) that is satisfied with "shallow faith"

"Just as the body without spirit is dead, so also faith without works is dead." (Jas.2:26)

1. Time:

James is most likely the first epistle written of the NT. Paul's first letter (Thessalonians) was written later.

2. Main message:

Paul: "How is salvation received?" James: "How can true faith be verified?"

3. Concerning works:

Paul: works of the law (can't save) - <u>Gal.2:16</u> James: works of faith (are the fruit) - <u>Jas.2:17</u>

- 3. Objections (V.18-20)
- 4. Examples (V.21-26)





 - 3. It is two-faced / deceitful (V.9-12)


- 1st (direct) order:

 - "... these things ought not to be this way!"




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

1. "You adulteresses" – The Problem (V.4-6)

- 1. Human desire
- 2. GOD's desire

2. "Submit therefore" – The Solution (V.7-10)

- 1. Submit
- 2. Resist
- 3. Draw near
- 4. Humble

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"The spirit that GOD gave us, desires jealously."

"The Spirit which is dwelling in us desires jealously."

"GOD desires jealously the spirit." "GOD desires the Spirit jealously."

"The (human) spirit that GOD gave us, desires jealously (for the wrong things)."

"The (Holy) Spirit which is dwelling in us desires jealously (to do the right thing)."

"GOD desires jealously the (human) spirit."


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- 1. Context: Pride or Humility (Earthly or Heavenly Wisdom) Jas.3:13-5:6
- 2. How should we make plans?

 - 4. Don't become self-sufficient / independent (V.16-17)

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

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
Today or tomorrow we shall... ... go to such and such a city... ... and spend a year there... ... and engage in business... ... and make a profit.





= to suffer, esp. being under affliction / suffering evil

O what peace we often forfeit, O what needless pain we bear, All because we do not carry Everything to God in prayer!

Have we trials and temptations? Is there trouble anywhere? We should never be discouraged, Take it to the Lord in prayer.


Are we weak and heavy-laden, Cumbered with a load of care? Precious Savior, still our refuge – Take it to the Lord in prayer.

= sick (18x in the NT), weak or feeble (14x in the NT)
